► In the increasingly busy and crowded knowledge-based economy, history dominates. Through 24/7 news bulletins, in the press, in fashion, on TV films, docu-dramas and documentaries; in novels, biographies and monographs; through local history associations, membership of the National Trust of English Heritage; at family visits to museums and theme parks; through local and national remembrance

ceremonies, 'sites of memory' and rituals of commemoration, history shapes the fabric of experience at every turn.

In this highly original, fascinating and engaging study, Martin L. Davies examines the consequences of living in such a historicized world and offers a critique of our obsession with historical knowledge, revealing how history informs and underpins narratives central to our understanding

of identity and society. The concept of historics, Davies argues, reveals how history has become an empty category- a repository of promiscuous meanings- and how it has become embedded in matrices of power and government.

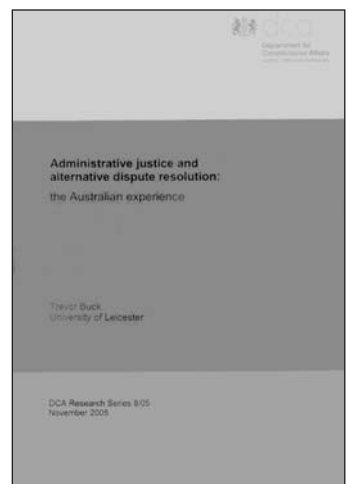
► This report, commissioned by the Department for Constitutional Affairs, examines the Australian system of administrative justice, in particular, the role of alternative dispute resolution (ADR) within that system. The report outlines developments across the courts, tribunals and ombudsmen offices, at both the Commonwealth and the State/Territory levels of government. The report finds that Australia has produced a rich range of ADR practice across these

cornerstone institutions, supported by a robust infrastructure, for example, the work of the National Alternative Dispute Resolution Advisory Council and related bodies.

There have been a number of important developments in the court system, in particular the role of mediation in family law has had a pervasive impact on the development of ADR generally. The pathway of tribunal development in Australia has generated the Commonwealth Administrative Appeals Tribunal, a model of a 'merits review' tribunal. There are also a number of other tribunals that present useful lessons, for example, the National Native Title Tribunal that addresses the sensitive problems of the rights and interests of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander

people. The new State Administrative Tribunal in Western Australia is also set to break new ground in the development of tribunal systems, in particular its flexible approach to customising the dispute forum to fit the nature of the dispute. The various ombudsman schemes in Australia have also made a significant contribution to administrative justice. They have increased both their use of ADR in respect of individual grievances and their focus on systemic issues arising from individual complaints.

The debates about various aspects of ADR will continue, in particular there are concerns that important questions of legal principle could be disregarded. The report concludes that what is required is a system that is



sufficiently sensitised to identifying appropriate routes of dispute resolution in their individual contexts.

## Writing under Tyranny

Writing Under Tyranny: English Literature and the Henrician Reformation

► At his accession Henry VIII was hailed by poets and scholars as the ideal prince who would inaugurate a new golden age of magnanimous, open kingship. The young king was determined to rule according to accepted models of virtuous lordship, and for two decades political culture was robust and effective and vigorous debate about matters of secular and ecclesiastical government thrived. By 1547, however, all this had changed,

and writers both at home and abroad condemned Henry as a tyrant. The story of this profound change provides the backdrop to Greg Walker's groundbreaking investigation of the impact of the emerging Henrician tyranny on the writing of a generation of poets, playwrights, prose-writers, and scholars.

Spanning the boundaries between literary studies and history, Writing Under Tyranny shows the profound

effects that political oppression had on the literary production of the years from 1528 to 1547, and how English writers in turn strove to mitigate, redirect, and finally resist that oppression. The result was the destruction of a number of literary forms that had dominated the writing of late-medieval England, but also the creation of new forms that were to dominate the literature of the following centuries.

Paradoxically, as Walker author demonstrates in four detailed case studies, the tyranny of Henry VIII gave birth to many modes of writing now seen to be characteristic of the English literary renaissance.

Organization Theory brings together in a single volume some of the most important contemporary work in the study of organization.

This edited collection will serve as an important introduction for students of organization and is essential reading for scholars across

the social sciences. Each of the eighteen chapters introduces, reviews and critically evaluates the work of a key theorist writing over the last two decades. Taking stock of the state of contemporary organization theory, the contributors to this volume engage powerfully

with each theorist and develop and extend their work, in ways that take us towards the future, and therefore beyond contemporary organization theory.

## The Constant Dialogue: Reinhold Niebuhr and American Intellectual Culture

► Voted in 1956 one of three most influential intellectuals in the United States, and a major presence for Martin Luther King, Jr and Jimmy Carter, the religious and social thinker Reinhold Niebuhr has in recent years been pushed into the background of American life. He is now largely read in theology departments though or seen

as formative influence on other American thinkers. However, as a theorist of 'just war theory', contemporary events in the US have propelled Niebuhr back to the forefront of debates. Within this context, this major new study *The Constant Dialogue: Reinhold Niebuhr and American Intellectual Culture*

repositions Niebuhr's thought – which spanned from World War I to the moon landing – at the heart of twentieth-century American culture, politics and religion.

Drawing extensively on archival material, this book focuses on the tensions between two dimensions of Niebuhr's thought: his political role as a radical social critic and the conservative drift of his religion. To better examine Niebuhr's philosophy, *The Constant Dialogue* positions him in a series of debates with other public intellectuals: William James, John Dewey, Paul Tillich, W. H. Auden, George Kennan and Martin Luther

King. In doing so, the book reassesses the central role of dialogue in Niebuhr's thought and the vital contribution he made to twentieth-century American culture.

Martin Halliwell is Professor of American Studies and Director of the Centre of American Studies at the University of Leicester. He is the author of four previous books, most recently *Images of Idiocy: The Idiot Figure in Modern Fiction and Film* (2004). An updated edition of his 2001 book *Transatlantic Modernism: Moral Dilemmas in Modernist Fiction* is published by Edinburgh University Press in November.
